I am writing to you as our records show that you are the owner of the above property, the property is privately rented and it has an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating of F or G.

Since 1st April 2018 the above Regulations have required landlords to comply with a minimum level of energy efficiency. From 1 April 2020, these requirements apply to all private rented properties not just when a new tenancy begins. If you rent a property with an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating of F or G (and have not applied for an exemption) you may be committing an offence of letting a substandard property and risk a financial penalty of up to £4,000.

Government guidance has been published to assist landlords to understand the Regulations, available from <https://www.mendip.gov.uk/energyefficiency> under 'Energy Performance and Cold Homes'.

Please contact us if this is the case with your property so we can help you make the improvements needed. If you have a new EPC which shows your property meets the requirements then please send us a copy. Further assistance is provided below.



DOMESTIC MINIMUM ENERGY EFFICIENCY STANDARDS (MEES)

...came into force in England and Wales on 1 April 2018, applies to private rented residential and non-domestic property and is aimed at encouraging landlords and property owners to improve the energy efficiency of their properties by a restriction on the granting and continuation of existing tenancies where the property has an Energy Performance Certificate Rating of F and G.



PM sets out lockdown exit plan

● Time to restart economy, says Johnson ● Three-month road map to open schools and shops ● Exercise rules relaxed this week

Boris Johnson has set Britain on the first tentative steps to "reopening society" with a road map out of lockdown.

The prime minister urged people last night to "go outside if you can't work from home" and said the time had come to begin restarting the economy.

In a televised address he laid out a three-month plan to reopen primary schools, allow sports clubs to open again,

Mr Johnson warned that every move was conditional on keeping transmission rates contained, but faced a backlash from business leaders who some businesses over the lack of detail given in the "road map".

From next month ministers hope to reopen gyms and swimming pools, and the recovery school year groups will also be allowed back, although others will not return until after the summer holidays.

In July, if the transmission rate is still under control, some bars and restaurants may be allowed to reopen, although pubs are likely to remain closed until August and potentially thereafter.

Full details of the road map are to be published today, alongside detailed guidance on how to safely reopen offices and factories.

Mr Johnson's speech came as:

● The coronavirus death toll rose to 38,000 in England on Saturday, the lowest daily tally in six weeks.

● Mr Johnson faced a call-in backblast

from the campaign to ban all day trips by

travellers coming to Britain.

Mr Johnson said that to prevent "reinfection from abroad" he was "seriously considering" whether to impose quarantine restrictions on people coming into the country by air.

Macron, the French president, said that would not apply between France and Britain "at this stage".

Mr leaders spoke about the need to manage the risks of new transmission arising from abroad, as the rate of community cases decreases domestically.

Dowling Street said:

"The prime minister and the president agreed to work together in taking the right approach to this crisis. No quarantine measures will apply to travellers coming from France at this stage, but any measures on either side must be taken in a concerted and reciprocal manner."

There was a backlash from the government's Cobra committee failure to increase the social distancing target, which it would jeopardise efforts to contain the virus.

Business leaders responded positively, to Mr Johnson's speech, with the CBI describing the plan as the "first glimmer of light for our faltering economy".

Caron Keating, the CBI director general, said: "A phased and careful return to work is the only way to protect

jobs and pay for future public services."

The emphasis on getting Britain back to work will be a theme again later this week when the prime minister, in another announcement to phase out the furlough scheme and that people working in construction or manufacturing should be "actively encouraged to go to work".

He said: "We hope that people will act on this, this week. So work from home if you can, but you should go to work if you can't work from home."

Many manufacturers, said their members were concerned that they would be forced to bring workers back under strict distancing rules. "In many parts of manufacturing, people will need to work much more closely than two feet apart," said Steve Phillips, its chief executive, said. "It is vital that the guidance is explicit about how this might be achieved."

Speaking after a remote meeting of the government's Cobra committee


